Wilmington Parks and Recreation Board Meeting Minutes August 25, 2015 Regular Meeting 6:00 P.M. Service Director's Conference Room—City Building

In attendance: Lori Williams, Director; Maria Butcher, Pres,; Leilani Popp, VP; Mark McKay, City Council Member; Paul Fear, City Treasurer; Mark Noland; Justin Gibson; and Todd Mangeot.

Maria welcomed all in attendance. Roll Call: Butcher and Popp present- Sean Gibson absent. Review and acceptance of the minutes for the August 3, 2015: Popp moved, Butcher seconded.

OLD BUSINESS:

Update on Scheduled Events: Fast Pitch Tournament October 3&4.
Karson Fund Raiser Sept. 26th

Lori discussed changes to the Park Facility Reservation request. She is looking to make minor changes to the form and it will be finalized and ready for review at the end of the year.

Grant Updates: Nature Works Round 20&21- The crack repair and sealing for the basketball and tennis courts are included in both rounds. The basketball court needs to be completed this year or we will lose our funding. Lori has worked with the vendor to get a 5 year guarantee for the sealing of the courts which does not include the edges of the court. The extended warranty exceeds the grant money will Lori has a plan to cover the extra expenses. ODNR Aquatic Education Program 2015-The Fishing with Mom program was a Great success with people catching fish and then getting to eat grilled and fried fish. The remaining money from the grant will be used to build a retaining wall.

Nature Works Round 22—still waiting to hear but we are the only app for Clinton County and it should be \$30,000.

Land and Water Conservation Fund—"Conditional Awarded Funding" of \$150,000.

American Academy of Dermatology Shade Structure Grant Program—we will be applying for a Grant in the next cycle. As part of the Grant application, we are doing a skin cancer awareness program by providing soccer parents information as well as posting skin cancer information on our park kiosks.

CDBG—Nothing new—agreements have been signed.

Recreational Trails Grant—Peace Path in need of lots of repairs. We will discuss later in the year.

Tony Hawk Foundation Grant—Lori will work on another Grant as she thinks there is still \$10,000 on the table for us.

Dog Park Update: Working on a Picnic table and taming the "wild area"

Stuckey Farm Park---Planted Monarch Butterfly habitat and have worked on the driveway. A men's group from the Presbyterian Church wants to help with the park. Split fencing is being priced out and will help to define the area.

Xidas Park Update-Things are looking good with more improvements to come.

Financial Update

Motion made by Popp seconded by Butcher to create a new line item for Stuckey Farm Park.

Motion made by Popp seconded by Butcher to accept a \$5000 donation from Ruth Stuckey for Stuckey Farm Park.

Motion made by Popp seconded by Butcher for a Supplemental Appropriation of \$5,000 to new Stuckey Farm Park Line Item; donation from Stuckey Family.

Motion made by Popp seconded by Butcher for a Supplemental Appropriation of \$2,000 to Grant Match Natureworks Round 20 540.430.5277 to cover additional cost of resurfacing basketball court. (Original grant estimate was \$4950.)

Motion made by Popp and seconded by Butcher for a Supplemental Appropriation of \$4,500 to Grant Match Natureworks Round 21 540.430.5280 to cover additional cost of resurfacing basketball court. (Original grant estimate was \$10,000.)

Williams pointed out that the monies in the supplemental appropriations were from the Park Recreational Fund—Banner Program monies—and NOT from the General Fund.

Motion made by Butcher and seconded by Popp for a Supplemental Appropriation of \$5,000 to Parks Improvement Fund. This is the Park Board commitment to David Williams Memorial

Motion made by Butcher and seconded by Popp to transfer \$500 from Background Checks 540.430.5412to Recreational Supplies 540.430.4332.

Motion made by Butcher and seconded by Popp for a Supplemental Appropriations from Rec Fund to Dog Park Project 540.430.5278 of \$1,144.70 (donations made to Park Legacy Fund specifically for dog park).

Williams talked about the beginning of fund raising for the remaining \$ 80,000 to \$100,000 needed for the David Williams Park Completion Project.

Shelter Policy for 2016: There are 234 requests to date for 2015. We decided that we would leave one shelter open each day—not rented—for people who could walk up and use.

Athletic Coordinator Update: Fall registration began July 13 with games beginning September 8th. As of today, 200 kids have signed up from preschoolers to 8th graders.

Maintenance Update:

A request has been made to Timbertech for an Observation Deck in the Lytle Creek Preserve.

There is an opportunity with DP&L to upgrade baseball field lights with LED lighting with a Grant.

Later this Fall drainage pipe will be installed on the Kiwanis and Rotary Fields.

Williams will start to work on a fixed asset maintenance plan on all parts of park system.

Damage to the Point Park Gazebo (run away tire) is \$680 and Williams is working with the truck driver's company.

We have transformed parks, built new features and have many more great things planned for the community in the future. Building Repair


Several roof structures require maintenance. Delaying this maintenance will add cost down the road due to under-structure damage.





Tree Work and Removal

Trees provide important environmental services but the effect of the Emerald Ash Borer on local ash trees has been devastating. There are several trees in park areas that need to be removed due to the potential risk of injury or damage. We received some funding through NatureWorks Grant program in 2015, but the \$3000 allocated cannot address all of the current tree needs.







Trail Work

The trails are in need of repair and we have an opportunity to apply for a grant through the Recreational Trails program in January of 2016. The applicable trails are nearly 2.5 miles long and preliminary estimate is \$80-100K for the needed work. The requested \$25K would be used for the 25% match.
